Why Shaping Future Places?

On 28th February 2018 we hosted a symposium inspired by the Garden Cities Association conference of 1901. We gathered a range of built environment experts, influencers and stakeholders to consider how we can create new places that will thrive long into the future – as Bournville does today.

The debate was more than a 'quick fix' to build houses in volume. The idea was to learn from the Bournville Village Trust and create an action plan for future places.





The Event

Around 80 people gathered in Bournville to debate the subject under five themes: Stewardship, Wellbeing, Technology, Delivery and Placemaking.

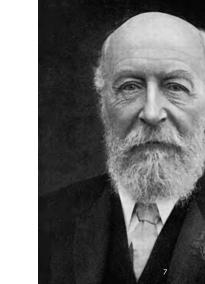
The 'wall' contained a series of provocations for each heading and attendees spent the day debating ideas, solutions and barriers inspired by these.

The responsible planning and management of resources and property

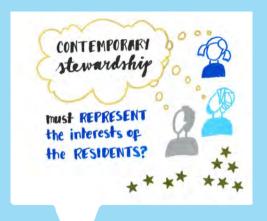




There is no definition of 'public good'



Develop local and national debate around what is 'good'





Having a real understanding of residents' needs and eliminating fear or suspicion



Let residents create a framework for future developments. Improve engagement and let them 'plant the seed'





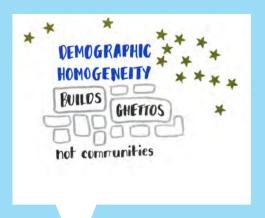
The planning system is too complex and difficult to understand, while single land owners capture all the value



Establish Trusts as a vehicle to recycle land value

WELLBEING

Is it possible to create a new place with wellbeing at its heart?





Only investing in specific asset classes prevents diverse communities



Analyse the metrics of successful mixed use developments to prove their investment value.





Transport strategies focus on macro issues not micro. Nobody wants to forward fund strategic infrastructure



Put transport alternatives in place early to discourage the use of the car





There is too much emphasis on quantity of space, not quality, and no agreement on maintenance



Develop a model with small groups of homes sharing and owning communal green spaces

TECHNOLOGY

Technology should be the enabler, not the outcome





Speed of technological change creates barriers for older people, and makes dated tech obsolete



Is technology itself the answer? Good placemaking already enables real social interaction





Design is led by a minority while social isolation is increasing for the majority



Use technology to create local hubs and engage with self-organising communities





Projects driven only by profit and without new ideas lack in culture



Start with the purpose, not the houses. Use technology to unify communities

DELIVERY

Modernise or die. Business as usual is not good enough





Neither the investment model nor the placemaking model exists



Empower enlightened landowners and create an overarching framework that includes stewardship principles





Land value and control of land. Do local authorities care enough about the delivery process?



Provide financial incentives to use modern methods of construction.

Is it VAT free?





Disconnect between land and delivery. Landowners can take value out of land through planning permission alone



Limiting land value in viability appraisals and taxing house sales

PLACEMAKING

The 'master developer' will set a benchmark for quality and put people first to shape places





Short term profit motivation



Demonstrate that placemaking increases value





People lack trust in the planning system which hides behind jargon; genuine engagement is costly and takes time



Working with communities to build trust and set out values from the start





People misunderstand the greenbelt. Nobody wants to tackle it because of the political and emotional attachment to the name



Reassess and rebrand the greenbelt against new criteria. Empower a body to promote its purpose outside local or national politics
